Pay careful attention to the yellow **WORKS CITED/BIBLIOGRAPHY PACKET** AND the pink "E-PAGES"—**MLA FORMAT: CITING ELECTRONIC SOURCES** you were given in class on how to do each particular type of source. **IT IS VERY EASY TO MAKE MISTAKES ON THIS ASSIGNMENT. FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS AND THE PUNCTUATION REQUIREMENTS CAREFULLY. DOUBLE CHECK!**

HINT: There may be some information given below that is actually not necessary to use. **ONLY USE THAT WHICH (according to the WORKS CITED packet and E-PAGES) IS CALLED FOR IN THE ENTRY.**

NOTE: The MLA Handbook, 6th edition, section 5.9.2, p. 216, states that the typical entry for an **entire internet site** (online scholarly project, information database, journal, or **professional site**) consists of the following items:

1. Title of the site (underlined)
2. Name of the editor of the site (if given)
3. Electronic publication information, including version number (if relevant and if not part of the title), date of electronic publication or of the latest update, and name of any sponsoring institution or organization.
4. Date of access and URL.

Note! If you cannot find some of this information, cite what is available.

Example:
